

# COLLEGIUM PHAENOMENOLOGICUM

Perugia, Italy

The Collegium Phaenomenologicum will convene for its fourteenth annual session at the Casa del Sacre Cuore, a villa in the Umbrian hills overlooking Assisi, near the Etruscan city of Perugia. To commemorate the one-hundredth anniversary of Martin Heidegger's birth the topic for 1989 is:

## HEIDEGGER: THE WORK OF THE 1930'S

The curriculum is designed for postdoctoral and doctoral students in philosophy or closely related disciplines. Its primary component will be four one-week courses.
